The first type is of multiple choices, where you should choose the only correct answer and mark it with an X accordingly. The second type is True or False, where you should write True or False in front of each statement. Lastly, in the third type, you will have to answer the questions as per the enunciation.

We also suggest that those biblical texts that are only mentioned be sought for and studied in your Bible.

At the end of each lesson, there will be an appeal so you can make a decision regarding the subject studied. You can mark either Yes or No. In case of doubts, clarification, and/or suggestions, we have left a space at the end of each lesson that can be used for this purpose if desired.

We pray that the Lord Jesus may bless and help you in the Christian journey.

BIBLE: THE CREATIVE WORD OF GOD

“You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about me.”

John 5:39

SUNDAY - THE BIBLE

The Bible was written over 1600 years, from 1500 years before Christ until around 100 years after Christ. Around 40 writers were used to transmit the messages of God to men. The Bible encloses 66 books, 39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament, which are divided into: history, poetry, prophecy, gospel, and letters. The Old Testament was written in Aramaic and Syriac, and the New Testament was written in Greek, except for the gospel of Matthew, which was written in Hebrew.

THE CREATION

Gold Verse:

*“Thus, the heavens and the Earth were completed in all their vast array.”
Genesis 2:1*

SUNDAY

By the word of the Lord the skies were brought into existence and all their armies through the spirit of His mouth”. “Because he spoke, and all came into existence, He ordered, and soon everything appeared”. “He set the foundation of the earth so it does not falter at any time.” When the earth came out from the hands of the Creator, it was extraordinarily beautiful. It had round-shaped mountains, hills, and plains with beautiful rivers cutting across them. It also had majestic trees, delicate flowers, and graceful bushes.

After the Earth, with its abundant animal and vegetal beings, was ready, man, the magnificent work of God, and to whom the entire earth had been prepared, was brought into the scene. God said: “Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule...over all the earth”. “So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female He created them”. Here, there is no room for mysteries or for ideas that man evolved through slow degrees from inferior forms of vegetal and animal beings. Such teachings greatly demote the work of the Creator to the low worldly conceptions of man.

“For since the creation of the world God’s invisible qualities – his eternal power and divine nature – have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so the men are without excuse” Romans 1:20

When we read the passage “When God created the man, he made him in the likeness of God. He created them male and female and blessed them. And when they were created, he called them man” (Genesis 5:1,2) and compare it to “In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was in God, and God was the word (Greek interlinear version). He was with God in the beginning” (John 1:1,2) we can notice that there is a great similarity that assists us in

understanding the relationship between God, the father, and Jesus, the only Son of God.

In the beginning, Eve existed in Adam, as part of him, a rib, until God took this rib out of Adam and made Eve. Likewise, in the beginning, the Verb (Christ) was with God. Afterwards, Christ was generated and “came out of God”, paraphrasing his own words of Jesus (John 16:27; 17:8). Then Christ became the only Son (only generated) of God. For this reason, the Bible states that man was created in the likeness of God.

“So the Lord God caused the man to fall into a deep sleep; and while he was sleeping, he took of the man’s rib and closed up the place with flesh. Then the Lord God made a woman from the rib he had taken out of the man, and he brought her to the man.” Genesis 2:21-22

God anesthetized Adam while he did the surgery of taking out the rib that would become Eve. But when generating Christ, there was nobody to anesthetize God. The Father chose to suffer this pain for us. God was about to create a being with free will and, should this moral being choose to sin, someone equal to God in character and love, His only Son, could die to rescue them. Even before the creation of man, God provided him with a Savior. How great is God’s love for us!”

LESSON 3

THE ORIGIN OF EVIL AND THE FALL OF MAN

Gold Verse:

“You were blameless in your ways from the day you were created till wickedness was found in you” Ezekiel 28:15

SUNDAY

We studied that God operated through his Son in the creation of all heavenly beings. In Him all things were created, be they thrones, domains, principalities, powers; everything was created by Him and for Him. Colossians 1:16

The fundamental of God’s government is the law of love. The happiness of all intelligent beings depends on the perfect harmony with the major principles of justice.

While all created beings recognized the loyalty for love, there was perfect harmony throughout the entire universe of God. However, a change occurred in this state of happiness. The sin originated with the one that, below Christ, had been the most honored by God, and the most exalted in power and glory among the inhabitants of heaven.

1. Who was Lucifer?

“You were anointed as a guardian cherub, for so I ordained you. You were in the holy mount of God; you walked among the fiery stones.” Ezekiel 28:14

Mark the correct option:

But if this happens to you, cry out just as Peter did. Just as the Lord Jesus held and sustained Peter, he shall do the same for you.

FRIDAY

There are two mistakes that the sons of God, mainly those who have only recently started trusting in His grace, must be aware of and avoid.

The first one is to take into consideration his own deeds, trusting in anything that he can do so that his harmony with God can be established. We do not gain salvation for our obedience, for salvation is a gift from God. We obtain it by faith.

The second, and not less dangerous, is the belief that Christ exempts man from the observance of God’s law. Luther said: “Only Christ takes the sin out of us; we cannot achieve this by means of all our works”. But the good works follow the redemption, as certain as the fruits show up in a living tree.

“We have come to share in Christ, if indeed we hold our original conviction firmly to the very end.” Hebrews 3:14

PRAYER

Gold Verse:

“Trust in him at all times, you people; pour out your hearts to him, for God is our refuge.” Psalm 62:8

Communication is very important. Through it, we can help, comfort, express our admiration, love, needs, and victories, as well as ask for relief, help, comfort, and more.

God communicates with us through the Bible, examples, and contemplation of the works created. He also communicates with us through dreams, visions, and through the life and example of our Lord Jesus, and we communicate with Him through our prayers. Through this means, we speak to God about our joys, sadness, and life's needs, and we ask Him to give us faith and trust in His power, which we so much need. The prayer allows us to have intimacy with God. How our prayer to God should be is what we will learn in the Bible in this lesson.

SUNDAY

1. What did the followers of Jesus ask?

“One day, Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, “Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.” Luke 11:1

LESSON 8

THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD IN ONE BIBLE'S CHAPTER

Gold Verse:

“But there is a God in heaven who reveals mysteries. He has shown King Nebuchadnezzar what will happen in days to come...” Daniel 2:28

SUNDAY

Around 600 years before Christ, Nebuchadnezzar was Babylon’s king, and his domain covered a great part of the entire earth, including the territory of Israel. Nebuchadnezzar, upon the conquest of Israel, turned the entire Jewish nation into slaves. Among the captives were four young men of distinguished families, named Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah. These young men used to stand out among the others due to their wisdom, obedience, and love for God, conquering, this way, the trust of King Nebuchadnezzar. One day, something happened that disturbed the peace of the king, let's see what happened...

1. Why was the king disturbed?

“In the second year of his reign, Nebuchadnezzar had dreams; his mind was troubled, and he could not sleep.” Daniel 2:1

LESSON 9

THE STONE OF HEAVEN AND THE KINGDOM OF GOD

Gold Verse:

“So this is what the Sovereign Lord says: “See, I lay a stone in Zion, a tested stone, a precious cornerstone for a sure foundation; the one who relies on it will never be stricken with panic.” Isaiah 28:16

SUNDAY

In the previous lesson, in the history of the world told by God to King Nebuchadnezzar, we saw that a rock was thrown, without the help of human hands, and hit the feet of Nebuchadnezzar’s statue and scrutinized it. “Then the iron, the clay, the bronze, the silver, and the gold were all broken to pieces and became like chaff on a threshing floor in the summer. The wind swept them away without leaving a trace. But the rock that struck the statue became a huge mountain and filled the whole earth” Daniel 2:35

Daniel, when interpreting the king's dream, compared the stone to the universal kingdom that God would establish forever. “In the time of those kings, the God of heaven will set up a kingdom that will never be destroyed, nor will it be left to another people. It will crush all those kingdoms and bring them to an end, but it will itself endure forever. This is the meaning of the vision of the rock cut out of a mountain, but not by human hands—a rock that broke the iron, the bronze, the clay, the silver and the gold to pieces.” Daniel 2: 44-45.

This kingdom must destroy and exceed all other existing ones and last forever. The time for the establishment of this kingdom should be “in the time of those kings”. This cannot be in reference to the four preceding

kingdoms, for they were not simultaneous with one another, but to the one that has been established after them instead. Much less can it refer to the establishment of the kingdom on the occasion of Jesus' first coming, given that the ten kingdoms that arose from the ruins of the Roman Empire had not yet come. It must be, therefore, a future event.

Note: The fall of the Roman Empire took place in 476 after Christ.

1. When, according to the Bible, will the kingdom of God be established?

“And the seventh angel sounded; and there were great voices in heaven, saying, The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord, and of his Christ; and he shall reign for ever and ever.” Revelation 11:15

In another parable, the Lord Jesus tried to clarify the kingdom of God to his servants. In this parable, He calls attention to the cornerstone which the builders rejected, which is He Himself. Matthew 21:33-45

“Jesus said to them, ‘Have you never read in the Scriptures: ‘The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; the Lord has done this, and it is marvelous in our eyes?’” Matthew 21:42

FRIDAY

Jesus was many times called the son of David. This expression symbolized or pointed to the Messiah, the one who would occupy the throne once occupied by King David, as an example of the one who would reign forever over his servants, not from one nation, but from all nations to form the Israel of God, or the winners in the name of Christ, being part of Jehovah’s army. While He was on the earth, Jesus did not occupy the throne. But after the resurrection, the Lord Jesus occupied the throne that belonged to Him by right as King of kings and Lord of lords.

SUNDAY

The Lord was going on His last visit to the city of Jerusalem, before His crucifixion. He was visibly dejected and sad while looking at the scenario of the city and temple, until he cried and said: “If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace—but now it is hidden from your eyes.” Luke 19:41-42

1. Why was Lord Jesus sad?

“The days will come upon you when your enemies will build an embankment against you and encircle you and hem you in on every side. They will dash you to the ground, you and the children within your walls. They will not leave one stone on another, because you did not recognize the time of God’s coming to you” Luke 19:43-44

Mark the correct option:

Everything that Lord Jesus said to the disciples is also applicable to us who live in the last days of the history of the earth. Lord Jesus provided defined signs, both on the destruction of Jerusalem and on his second coming.

MONDAY

Lord Jesus, replying to the disciples, indicated that neither the end of the world nor the destruction of the Jewish nation would take place immediately.

4. What then did Lord Jesus reply?

“Jesus answered: “Watch out that no one deceives you. For many will come in my name, claiming, ‘I am the Messiah,’ and will deceive many. You will hear of wars and rumors of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come” Matthew 24:4-6

Therefore, as the surrounding of Jerusalem was a sign of escape for the christians of that time, the establishment of the abomination that brings the desolation in the holy place, will be the future sign for the christians of today to flee to the mounts (we will study the meaning of the expression “abomination that brings the desolation” in the lessso “Sign of God”).

WEDNESDAY

8. Lord Jesus continued to speak prophetically regarding the affliction that would take place in the world, as never before, and provided some recommendations.

“For false messiahs and false prophets will appear and perform great signs and wonders to deceive, if possible, even the elect. See, I have told you ahead of time. “So if anyone tells you, ‘There he is, out in the wilderness,’ do not go out; or, ‘Here he is, in the inner rooms,’ do not believe it. For as lightning that comes from the east is visible even in the west, so will be the coming of the Son of Man.” Matthew 24:24-27

Such signs that already happened in the past, showing us that the end of times has come, will happen again in our days.

LESSON 11

A THOUSAND YEARS OF PEACE

Gold Verse:

“I saw thrones on which were seated those who had been given authority to judge. And I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded because of their testimony about Jesus and because of the word of God. They had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands. They came to life and reigned with Christ a thousand years.” Revelation 20:4

SUNDAY

The Bible presents in the book of Revelation a term of a thousand years (millennium), during which there will be a judgment in which the saved ones will participate.

Let's know what the Word of God reveals to us about the Millennium. We will see what events trigger its start and end, as well as what will take place on earth and in heaven during these thousand years.

1. Does the Bible mention a term of a thousand years?

“I saw thrones on which were seated those who had been given authority to judge. And I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded because of their testimony about Jesus and because of the word of God. They had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands. They came to life and reigned with Christ a thousand years.” Revelation 20:4

Mark the correct option:

- a) No.
- b) Yes.
- c) I don't know.

2. Whom will the saints judge?

“If any of you has a dispute with another, do you dare to take it before the ungodly for judgment instead of before the Lord’s people? Or do you not know that the Lord’s people will judge the world? And if you are to judge the world, are you not competent to judge trivial cases? Do you not know that we will judge angels? How much more the things of this life!” I Corinthians 6:1-3

Mark the correct option:

And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.” Peter wanted to accompany Jesus to those mansions, but Jesus said: “Whither I go, thou canst not follow me now; but thou shalt follow me afterwards.” John 12:33. This clarifies that when He returns to Earth to receive His people, He will take them to the house of His Father, in heaven.

7. What will happen to the wicked alive when Christ comes?

“Just as it was in the days of Noah, so also will it be in the days of the Son of Man. People were eating, drinking, marrying, and being given in marriage up to the day Noah entered the ark. Then the flood came and destroyed them all. “It was the same in the days of Lot. People were eating and drinking, buying and selling, planting and building. But the day Lot left Sodom, fire and sulfur rained down from heaven and destroyed them all. It will be just like this on the day the Son of Man is revealed.” Luke 17:26-30.

Mark the correct option:

- a) They will be destroyed by the splendor of Jesus' return.

Note: The apostle Paul states in I Thessalonians 5:3 that when they were saying, “Peace and safety,” sudden destruction will come upon the wicked, and there will be no way for them to escape. When Christ returns, the saints will be set free and taken to heaven, and all the wicked alive will be suddenly destroyed, as they were in the flood.

Refer also to: II Tessalonians 1:7-9, Revelation 6:14-17, 19:11-21, and Jeremy 25:30-33. There will be no general resurrection of the wicked except at the end of the millennium. Thus, the Earth will be empty, without a single human being during this whole time.

TUESDAY

8. Mark T for the correct answers and F for the false answers related to the following passages about the events that will indicate the beginning of the millennium in heaven:

Note: The millennium begins when the seventh (and last) trumpet sounds. It announces the congregation of the saints with Christ by occasion of His second coming.

I looked, and there were no people; every bird in the sky had flown away. The term abyss, Genesis 1:1, applies to the earth in its desolated state, deserted, chaotic, dark, and uninhabited. It will remain in this state for a thousand years. It will be the dark prison of Satan during this period. But the prophecy of Isaiah says: "They will be visited after many days".

The wicked resurrect with the same rebel spirit that they previously had. Satan is then released from this long period of captivity and inactivity.

“When the thousand years are over, Satan will be released from his prison and will go out to deceive the nations in the four corners of the earth - Gog and Magog - and to gather them for battle. In number, they are like the sand on the seashore.” Revelation 20:7-8

THE ORIGIN, HISTORY, AND DESTINY OF SATAN

“The one who does what is sinful is of the devil, because the devil has been sinning from the beginning. The reason the Son of God appeared was to destroy the devil’s work.” I John 3:8

SUNDAY

The enemy of God and men like us sees him as a fairy tale figure that should not inspire fear or threat to anybody. It is his plan to act like this, so he is free to deceive and distort the Scriptures. If we do not see or admit an opponent, how are we supposed to fight against him?

The objective of this lesson is to clarify what the Bible says about this enemy as well as how to overcome his traps and falsehoods, following the example of Jesus.

1. Did anyone else sin, besides the human kind?

“For if God did not spare angels when they sinned, but sent them to hell, putting them in chains of darkness to be held for judgment.” II Peter 2:4

This understanding is implicit in the words of Jesus, when speaking on the consequences of His crucifixion, saying: "Now is the judgment of this world; now shall the prince of this world be cast out." John 12:31. His final fall and destruction are yet to come.

THE PROBATION AND ITS OBJECTIVES

Gold Verse:

“Dear friends, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that has come on you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice inasmuch as you participate in the sufferings of Christ, so that you may be overjoyed when his glory is revealed.” I Pe. 4:12-13

SUNDAY

The suffering and the affliction always intrigue human beings. The pain seems completely out of God’s plans and purposes for our lives. Whenever we are faced with difficulties, the first thing that comes to mind is, 'Has God forgotten about me?' Would it be that He has no joy in me and is torturing me for my sins? We may not know the reasons, but one thing is certain: we all go through this experience, eventually, one way or another. How we face the difficulties reveals a great deal of our character.

1. What importance does the proof of our faith have?

“These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith - of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire - may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed.” I Peter 1:7
